Last night we held this year's Music Showcase, one of my favourite nights of the year. I was so impressed with the students' confidence and progress, especially considering for a portion of the year we were not able to hold musical instruction at school due to COVID. I was proud of our new band students who performed for the first time since starting to learn an instrument this year and also was impressed by those who were brave enough to perform solos in their instruments!

I well remember when I first started learning trombone at 10 years old, how exciting and challenging it was... not to mention heavy! © Of course the biggest challenge in learning an instrument is having the discipline for regular practice at home. There are no shortcuts when it comes to learning an instrument, and we thank all of the parents for encouraging their children to practise regularly and for sitting through the







occasional inevitable wrong notes. There is a great deal of research showing that learning an instrument can enhance verbal memory, spatial reasoning, and literacy skills... plus it's just so rewarding and fun!

For those who may not be aware, we have the following music opportunities available for our students:

- Free instrumental music lessons for Year 4-7 students (there is an instrument hire fee if you do not have your own), with the opportunity to learn trumpet, trombone, euphonium, tuba, alto or tenor saxophone, clarinet and flute, and to be part of our school band:
- Private guitar, piano and drum lessons which take place at school, starting from the early grades, with drum students forming part of the school Drum Ensemble;
- and Festival of Music Choir for all Year 4-6 students and Year 7 by choice.


Junior primary students this year have been learning music with their class teachers and we are hoping to reinstate our Junior Primary choir next year, COVID willing.

Round the Classes

Reception: Ms Bowley has introduced more Eric Carle books to our class. For *The Tiny Seed* we used the ipads to take photos of flowers. We then enlarged them, screenshot and printed them and turned them into beautiful flowers full of describing words. Now they are on display in the hallway.



Year 1/2: We have been busy learning how to write and publish our narrative stories with Bianca. We are also learning about 2D and 3D shapes in maths. As part of HASS with Stephen's class we are learning about weather maps and are about to start making our own weather reports.

Year 2/3: We have enjoyed learning about weather maps with student teacher Bianca and the Year 1/2 class. We have specifically learnt how to read the weather forecast for different towns and cities around Australia.

Year 4/5: We enjoyed our visit to Urrbrae High School. We spent the morning at their wetlands and participated in various activities looking at how the wetlands benefit plant and animal life. In the afternoon we went to their farm sections and saw their aquaculture set up, sheep and sheep shearing, cows, horses, chickens, native birds, and a nocturnal enclosure.

In writing, our class has been working on writing persuasive arguments for and against 'Students should be paid for good grades'. We presented these debates in class and it is too close to call which side won.

In geography we are comparing two different continents, so far, we have just begun to investigate Africa.

Year 6/7: We had a last debate this week and although only 4 people participate in the actual event the whole class gives feedback, make suggestions, and use great audience skills when our debaters are practising.

We have started looking more in-depth at how to develop our characters in our writing and it is enjoyable watching everyone grow in this area.

We have finished our work on percentages and are much more confident in this, now we have moved on to the properties of circles and finding their area and circumference.

We are looking forward to Lightning carnival on Monday.

Indonesian: We have been super busy consolidating all the words and phrases we have learnt this term in our Keluarga (family) topic. We are aiming for automaticity in our spoken language, which takes a lot of practice.

Science: The last two weeks the classes have been doing revision and assessment tasks on what they have learnt in Science this year. They have also been creating new machines that use the axle and wheels.

Thank you to all those who have donated boxes to the Science room.

PE/Health: We have finished our touch footy and we are now revisiting athletics for Sports Day. It's great to see so many students in sneakers as we are doing a lot of running activities.
